PASTORAL PERSPECTIVE

Greetings friends,

As we enter the month of March, I find myself thinking about how strange the passage of time has been this past year. Perhaps you have also found yourself wondering about the fluidity of time, how some days have seem very long, others quite short. Sometimes I am unclear what day of the week it is and other times I have a very precise knowledge of each hour as it passes.

I find myself looking at my calendar and pausing on March 15th, the one-year anniversary of our first PianoSide worship service. I remember the moment a few days before, when I realized that we would not be gathering for worship together in person on Sunday - my mind racing to figure out an alternative way to offer worship on short notice. I remember meeting online with Kristin Camp and Hank Robinson to think through what a recorded service might be like, and I remember Jerry Brabec's willingness to first give it a try and then to lead us forward into the next weeks, month and year. A year prior, I was still at South Gate UMC in Lincoln; a few months prior I would have laughed and laughed if you had told me Saint Paul would have our own YouTube channel posting original content at least four times weekly. And yet, here we are.

Today, I celebrate our congregation's resilience this past year, and I celebrate a new worship service that was born out of sudden necessity and has become part of our regular schedule. I also am looking forward to working with our reopening team, comprised of our clergy and a group of laity, to plan to add people back to our worship services. We are beginning by adding a small "studio audience" to our 10:00 a.m. Sunday live stream worship. If you are interested in being part of this group, please email or call the church office to be added to the waiting list; at this point we know we have a cap of 65 people in the sanctuary (25% capacity) and hope to add ten people per week. In addition, you will find a survey inside this issue that will help us assess how many worship services will be necessary to meet our current needs for in-person worship. It is my hope that all of you know we want you to be comfortable, and that both online and in-person attendance "count" as participation. Towards that end, soon you will find an online attendance sign-in so you can let us know you joined us for worship - no matter what day you join us and list prayer concerns.

Thank you for your support and care of Saint Paul, one another and the clergy and staff of this church - we look forward towards this next year in our faith journey together.

March is shaping up to be more than just our yearly Lenten spiritual journey. It is also a journey into what it means to return to "in-person" worship. Being able to gather for weekend services officially came to a halt on March 14/15 last year. We have waited long and are ready to cautiously begin assembling once again. Each week, as we move toward Easter, more of you will be encouraged to be a part of a "studio audience" for 10:00 a.m. worship in the Sanctuary and, mid-month at the Saturday evening at 5:00, Roth Chapel service. Since we continue in the midst of the COVID-19 crisis, we must remember to: mask; practice physical and socially distance with personal and environmental hygiene; be mindful of when you or others are ill and of crowded settings; participate in active screening and follow quarantine and isolation guidelines when necessary. More "how-to's" for worship may be found in this issue. Watch for special congregational mailings that will also promote the ways and times we may return to more "in-person" forms of worship as we journey toward a brighter Easter day!

In her reflections about the time in which we find ourselves musical composer, arranger and poet, Alice **Parker**, writes,"...Being a musician is one of the most human things we can be. We are really exalting our voices, our breath, our minds, our imaginations, our love of language, our love of musical forms and possibilities. And we are engaging in something which...includes the generations in a way that almost nothing else can, and leaps over differences in class and education and financial status and all of those other things. It's like the sound that fills a room, fills our hearts. And so it's one of the most human and one of the most rewarding and one of the most civilizing things that we can do, is to sing together. And boy, do I recommend that we do a whole lot of it the minute we can get back together again and sing in the same room with each other."

Clergy Corner—Rev. Jerry Brabec

Sunday, April 12, 2020 was a celebration day of sorts. Not a national holiday or a "key to the city" kind of event, but a special day only to this writer. Fifty years prior, on Easter Sunday in 1970, a very nervous but excited eighth grader slid across the bench and set out to offer his first organ prelude. The notes to "Were You There" had been fairly carefully practiced over the previous ten weeks. The ruling Session of the little Presbyterian Church in Council Bluffs had awarded two \$50 scholarships, enough for ten organ lessons each, to a high school junior who had achieved nine years of piano playing and a fourteen year old hack who had given up piano lessons years before, favoring a more lucrative career in the form of a paper route! By the time summer had ended, a one month on/one month off schedule was in place, but the details from there seem a bit sketchy, including a six month stint with a left leg cast. With the summer of 1971 and the graduation of the high school-er, it fell to the hack to provide appropriate music for weekly worship. And so began this lifelong pursuit of the ministry of worship. Since we weren't able to celebrate the Easter holiday last year (no need to remind you as to why) it seems appropriate to lift it up this time around. Weather in the Midlands being what it is, there were several years that Palm Sunday was a wash due to spring snowmageddons but, the memory of no Easter is truly a foreign one. Perhaps that's what makes the thought of returning to "in person" worship in time for the Paschal celebration so much sweeter. It will be Saint Paul's own symbol of resurrection of sorts. The Body of Christ assembling to proclaim once again, "He is risen indeed!"

July 14 and 15 (Wednesday and Thursday) will be virtual. Bags will be handed out of ahead of time to those who have pre-registered.


July 18 (Sunday) we will meet at church and have a very fun time following the worship service.
