PASTORAL PERSPECTIVE

It's May, and my mind is wandering towards rhubarb. Both of my grandmothers were culinary artists with rhubarb, sometimes using less sugar and more meringue than suited my childhood palate. Our spring and early summers included recipes from both sides of the family as well as our church and local 4-H cookbook. Over the years, I have relied on the topic of rhubarb as a conversation starter at many a summer potluck; I believe to encounter rhubarb is to form an opinion not just of the flavor but the best form in which to consume, share, and tend to it.

A few years ago I added rhubarb to my front yard garden because there were some spots that needed leafy green texture. Last spring when we were sorting out those first months of a global pandemic, I found myself in the front yard digging up rhubarb, iris and lilies to divide and replant. It seemed the entire neighborhood was out for a walk those days, and many people I had never before met would pause to say hello and ask about the garden. I quickly realized I would have less digging to do if I offered the multiplying plants to my new friends. As grocery bag after grocery bag of plants walked away with neighbors I found myself thinking about how we find opportunities to share and care in unexpected places. My neighbors thought they were out for a walk and I thought I was tending a garden and instead we ended up learning more about each other and spreading plant love.

We at Saint Paul are ready for a season of learning more about our neighbors and sharing God's love, in ways that are appropriate for a community where, as of this writing, levels of Covid19 transmission are still considered high. Stay tuned for information about a summer of neighborhood adventure, including a return to Benson First Fridays and new partnerships in and around Benson. This is a repeated article, first run in 2020 and three months into the COVID 19 pandemic. It is still valid for much of May 2021, but has been updated with the current information: "The weeks since Governor Ricketts put social distancing requirements for Nebraska into motion have been filled with challenges, to be sure. Your clergy staff hopes that the creative solutions for worship we are attempting have helped to satisfy your spiritual needs, as well as the safety issues with which we are now faced. The development of weekly "PianoSide Chats" has been a very rewarding process (and will continue into the future for those needing/ enjoying an on-line way to worship) and, although your clergy have been the primary faces on the screen, we'd be totally lost without the technical expertise of member, Hank Robinson. A simple "thank you" seems so meager, but it remains a heartfelt offering, nonetheless. (Thanks also to our departed comrade, Warren Johnson and soon, Kristin Camp!) Through the weeks of May (Memorial Day) you will be moved by gifts for worship from many lay members whose faces you may find familiar. It is hoped that there may be some sort of "in person" worship by May 31, when we could possibly gather to celebrate the festival of Pentecost. As to what that/those service(s) may look like we are unable to share with you at this time. (We now gather in person each Saturday evening at 5:00 in Roth Chapel and again on Sunday morning at 10:00 in the Sanctuary. In person celebrations of the Sacrament of Holy Communion will be offered May 01/02. Special services to mark both Pentecost on May 22/23 Memorial Day on May 29/30 will grace our worship.) Please be assured that every effort is being made to restore an "in person" weekly worship option that exceeds the mandatory safety requirements being outlined now and in the weeks to come. For those of the congregation that feel "tech savvy" we ask that you stay abreast of the information coming to you via our website, e-blast, and Facebook/Twitter/Instagram presence and share it as you are able. For those of us who find a hands-on paper copy to be our only link, remember that by the time you receive this the information will, most likely, be out of date! If you leave a voice mail it will be returned and in the meantime...stay safe and stay with God!" What a difference a year makes!

Mission Update: Mercy And Justice at Work

Although it has been several years since members and friends of Saint Paul Church have undertaken the mission of sponsoring a refugee family, the ties that bind us when we do are indeed strong ones. This article is a brief touch stone on the Rai Families, who happen to share the same last name, but are not related. Our relationship with these two families continue through friendship and the Christian love, as evidenced by the report of Dee Maycock and Linda Mead:

"As many may recall, the Raju Rai Family, including Dhan's father, Narbu Tamang, had joined St. Paul, being sponsored in 2010. In 2015 the family became active founders of the Abhisek Nepali Church congregation which met in our Fellowship Hall until Covid-19 interfered. It had been "born" in the living room of their Habitat home, and Mani, Subam and Monika continue to be part of the worship leadership. The congregation is currently meeting at 5151 N 33rd Street. Covid-19 hit all of the family except Subam and his wife Sumika, who had moved to their own home. It took the life of Narbu on May 15, 2020 and in a way also tiny beautiful Hosanna, daughter of Mani and Sapana, who arrived at four pounds two ounces on September 22, 2020. As Mani said on October 20, 2020, "she went to also live in God's house." Raju continues to be employed at QPI company, Mani and Subam are at Fiserv working in different departments. Monika is a sophomore at North High. Subam was the first to become a citizen on February 02, 2017 so he could sponsor his wife. Dhan and Raju became citizens on August 22, and September 17, 2019. Monika is a citizen as their daughter, but an official ceremony has not yet taken place. Mani planned to become a citizen with Sapana when she becomes eligible, so we look forward to that as well. We are fortunate to have them all still a part of the St. Paul family." Written with love by Grandma Dee Maycock.

"Easter is a time of renewal, one of new beginnings. This would characterize a lovely visit I had this Easter, being invited to dinner at the Kuber Rai Family home that afternoon. You might remember them as a family Saint Paul and our Mercy and Justice team mentored when they first came to Omaha in 2014. Peg Reed and I were free and could help them with health visits, rides, and other things during the day. It was a wonderful experience; we learned a lot about their culture and found out how very special they are. We even had an indoor picnic one rainy day with some clergy and M & J team members. The pandemic is winding down, shots are taken...and the renewal has begun! They live in a lovely home with a number of Nepalese in the area. Kuber is just retiring from Tyson's while Tika is still working there. Sunita, the oldest daughter has married, while Samjana has graduated from Benson High School. Both work for a company near their home. The youngest, Apshana, is a very talented artist and will be in tenth grade at Burke this fall. She has weathered nicely with both in-person and remote learning. It has been so great to catch up with them. We've scheduled a picnic soon; hopefully it won't be raining then." 
E-Newsletter
