This past week's Gospel reading included the story of Lazarus. We know that Easter is very close when hearing the message that Jesus was angry and wept at the tomb of his very good friend. That he gave the command that the stone be rolled away so that he could come out of tomb and being resurrected.

We approach Palm Sunday as this year's Lenten journey nears the end. This time it will be Jesus who is on the brink of death and new life. It's never easy to lose our friends or family.
