They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Spirit enabled them to speak.

They were mystified because everyone heard them speaking in their native languages. They were surprised and amazed, saying, "Look, aren't all the people who are speaking Galileans, every one of them? 8 How then can each of us hear them speaking in our native language?
